

## Do you love your pet?

If lost, could your pet tell anyone where it lives? Could your dog hop on a bus, jump on the light rail or call a cab? Unfortunately, none of these options exist.

In a perfect world, it would be nice to prevent animals from getting lost and potentially ending up at the Foothills Animal Shelter. The shelter and the City of Lakewood, as well as the other cities in Jefferson County, want to ensure that you and your pet are easily reunited if you are ever separated. That's the main benefit of the required annual dog license: to help you and Fido or Fluffy enjoy a long, happy companionship together.

A pet license puts information in the hands of animal control officers and others, which allows you to be contacted immediately any time of day or night about your lost pet. In many cases, Lakewood's animal control officers can bring your pet directly home. Should Fido decide



to go for a walk all by himself, any good human can read his license tag and help get him home. As a responsible dog owner, you also avoid receiving a fine for having an unlicensed canine.

Dog licensing has been in place since 2007, and Foothills Animal Shelter is now overseeing the program. The shelter, located

near West Sixth Avenue and Indiana Street, serves all of the communities in Jefferson County as the temporary residence and safe haven for lost, abandoned or neglected pets. Annually, Foothills Animal Shelter cares for nearly 8,000 dogs, cats and other animals. The state-of-the-art facility also offers services such as

adoption, spaying and neutering, vaccinations and microchipping.

When you purchase a pet license in Lakewood, your fee helps support Foothills Animal Shelter in reuniting pets with their owners, matching orphaned pets with new owners and providing other lifesaving work. By helping your own pet, you're also helping a lot of other animals get a fair shake too.

A license is only \$15 a year or \$30 for animals that are not spayed or neutered. You can get a license or renew it annually three ways — online, mail or in person at one of 50-plus locations including the shelter. Lakewood residents also can get licenses at the City Clerk's Office. ## Bicycles yield for safety on trails

Lakewood's network of earthen and multiuse trails is extensive with heavy use year-round by residents exploring the great outdoors in a variety of ways and for different reasons. Some love a casual stroll, others explore on horseback, and some enjoy a vigorous bicycle workout while others ride just for fun.

Every year, conflicts and incidents happen between cyclists and pedestrians that can be avoided by maintaining reasonable speeds, yielding in accordance with regulations, keeping dogs close on a leash, and communicating effectively. Whatever your passion and reason for being out on the trail, please keep a few things in mind for your safety and



the safety and enjoyment of others:

- Bikes, and other wheeled users, yield to pedestrians. All users yield to equestrians.
- Use common courtesy

and do your part to resolve communication issues or conflicts on the trail.

- Always occupy the right side of the trail.

### Bicyclists:

- Pass only on the left. Slow to a safe speed and make sure the party you are passing understands what you are doing.
- Keep your speed to 15 mph or less, keeping in mind that trails are used by everyone, including small children, and that "safe speed" really depends on the situation.

### Pedestrians:

- Don't block the entire trail.
- Keep dogs on a short leash and under control.

### Equestrians:

- Ride only on designated soft-surface trails.
- Communicate with other trail users to create safe passing opportunities.

## Letter from the mayor

### Democracy: one individual going to one meeting

One of the most frequent questions asked of me these past six years is: "How did you become the mayor?" It's a simple question with a complex answer, but one that perhaps can be distilled down to one statement: I became involved in my community, and the rest is history.

I certainly did not set out to become a mayor (and often joke that I might worry about someone who has that goal in life!). Back in 1993, I got engaged in a neighborhood land-use dispute. A developer wanted to build something that my neighbors felt was incompatible with our neighborhood. As often happens, there was plenty of shouting and hard feelings. That didn't seem to me to be very productive. I was able to suggest a compromise plan that was accepted

by the developer, the neighbors and the City, and the project was eventually built according to that plan.

It was my first involvement, even my first real awareness of my local government. At that time, Mayor Linda Morton suggested I apply for an opening on the Planning Commission. Six years there led to eight years on City Council and then on to my current six years as mayor. My history is by no means unique. It's been repeated thousands of times around the country. Local government is not really politics. It's public service at its purest, being performed by friends, neighbors and small businesspeople who all simply care about their hometowns.

There are countless ways to get involved. Most don't really take that much time, and many of them are profiled in this issue. Would you like to just start out by getting to know some of your neighbors a bit better? Well, you could take part in National Night Out on Aug. 6, or join Nextdoor.com, the new, modern way to be neighborly, with 65 localized groups already up and running in Lakewood.

If you are interested in learning more about how our city works, apply for Civics 101 (page 7). It's a broad overview of every aspect of your local government. For those who have a specific interest in planning and land use, you might think about applying for the Citizens' Planning Academy (page 8). This is an intensive, yet fun, inside look into the discipline that contemplates what our city might look like in the future.

Featured in this issue is a discussion of the upcoming process involved in updating our current Comprehensive Plan, as well as creating Lakewood's first Sustainability Plan. Our Planning Commission will play a critical role in both these efforts that will ultimately formulate our new community vision. Like City Council, these seven volunteer commissioners are local neighbors who care about our city. Given the large number of residents who have completed the Planning Academy, it is virtually a requirement that one have the expertise gained from that curriculum to become a member of the Planning Commission. The future leaders of this great

community are not just on City Council or on one of our commissions. They are residents, neighbors, businesspeople and students who may be reading this column right now. Are you one of them? Lakewood's wonderful quality of life, strong financial standing and plethora of opportunity is a result of many factors. We're creative, collaborative and inclusive in our decision-making. We have had a continuum of great leadership, not just from elected officials and city management, but from those in our neighborhoods and businesses who care so deeply about our city.

Most of all, we encourage civic engagement. It's something that starts with one individual, going to one meeting or embracing one issue. It is democracy at its best. I hope some of you will "take the plunge" and try to get as involved as your time or interest will allow you to. I promise, you will be glad you did!

### Raise your voice above the crowd: Participate in upcoming open houses

It was a dark and stormy night. That's a classic book beginning, but it also describes a stretch of heavy rain and lightning in mid-July. It has been another year of crazy, unpredictable weather: droughts, flash floods, fire and a month of snowstorms last April. Lakewood must be ready for changes that occur, whether it's the weather or changes in our built environment. With the opening of the W Line light rail, we have seen our share of changes, and that's just the beginning. Lakewood's current Comprehensive Plan was adopted in 2003. A lot has changed since then, and Lakewood needs to prepare and plan for the future. As such, Lakewood is beginning the process of updating its Comprehensive Plan and

developing its first Sustainability Plan.

Some might ask, what is a Comprehensive Plan and why should I care? The Comprehensive Plan sets the framework for land use, transportation and economic development for Lakewood. It acts as a kind of guidebook for the Planning Commission and City Council when we make land-use decisions. It helps Lakewood plan for what our city will look like in the future. It gives residents some certainty and understanding of how the city will change and how it will not.

The Sustainability Plan will create a blueprint for Lakewood to become more resource and energy efficient, to meet ecological and economic challenges and to protect vital resources like our air, water, climate and ecosystems. It's the first step in a process to make sure that Lakewood is able to maintain the resources that we need, not only to survive, but to maintain a good quality of life. It will prepare us to be ready to adapt to environmental factors over which we have no control and will place us on a stronger footing in an uncertain world.

Both of these plans provide critical guidance to community leaders by taking feedback from the community about what residents, business owners and community members

want for their city and how they want the city to look, act and feel long into the future. That's why it is so important for you to get engaged in this process and tell us what you want in this document. Too often, we find that people get involved only after they see something they don't like in a document or a project. Often it is so late in the process that it is difficult to change and even harder to know how widespread this concern is. By getting involved early and often, you can help shape this document and your city. You can be a leader in your community. You can have more control over your future and that of your children and grandchildren.

There are many opportunities to participate in the process, and those will continue during the next couple of years. There will be a series of open houses for residents to learn more about what areas need discussion and to share their ideas about their vision for Lakewood. These open houses are Sept. 18, Oct. 1, Oct. 15, Oct. 29 and Nov. 12 this fall. Each will focus on a different area of the plan so you may attend them all or pick the area that is more interesting or more concerning to you by reviewing page 4 and 5 in this newsletter. We, as your Ward 1 City Council members, will resume our monthly meetings with residents in

September on the third Saturday of the month, 9 a.m. at the 40 West Arts District, 1560 Teller St. You can talk to us about your thoughts for the city's future, and the process will continue through 2014 as staff begins to write the plan, based upon the public comments. There will be additional opportunities to comment on the plan once a draft has been completed. We hope to finalize the plan in February 2015, but don't wait until then to get involved. Your voice can rise above the crowd if you get involved early in the process. Please take the time to participate in this process and shape the future of your city.



## Help with buying a home

The new Metro Mortgage Assistance Plus program, available to Lakewood residents, helps with buying a home through down payment and closing cost assistance. Aimed at reducing the usual barriers to owning a home, the program can provide a 4 percent grant to buy a home.

Interested buyers are encouraged to speak with one of the 12 preapproved lenders participating in the program listed at [www.denvergov.org/housing](http://www.denvergov.org/housing). Along with completing free home-buyer counseling, each buyer needs to meet standard loan guidelines such

as having a credit score of at least 640 and meeting income limits (not more than \$91,100 for households of two or fewer people and not more than \$103,000 for three or more). Buyers don't have to be first-time owners, and there is no time limit on when the individual or family last owned a home. There is also no maximum purchase price.

Single-family homes, condominiums, townhomes and manufactured homes qualify for the program, with the requirement that the owner occupy the home as a primary residence. Mortgage refinancing does not qualify.




